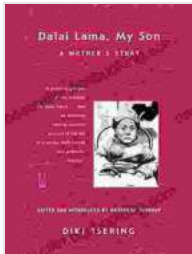

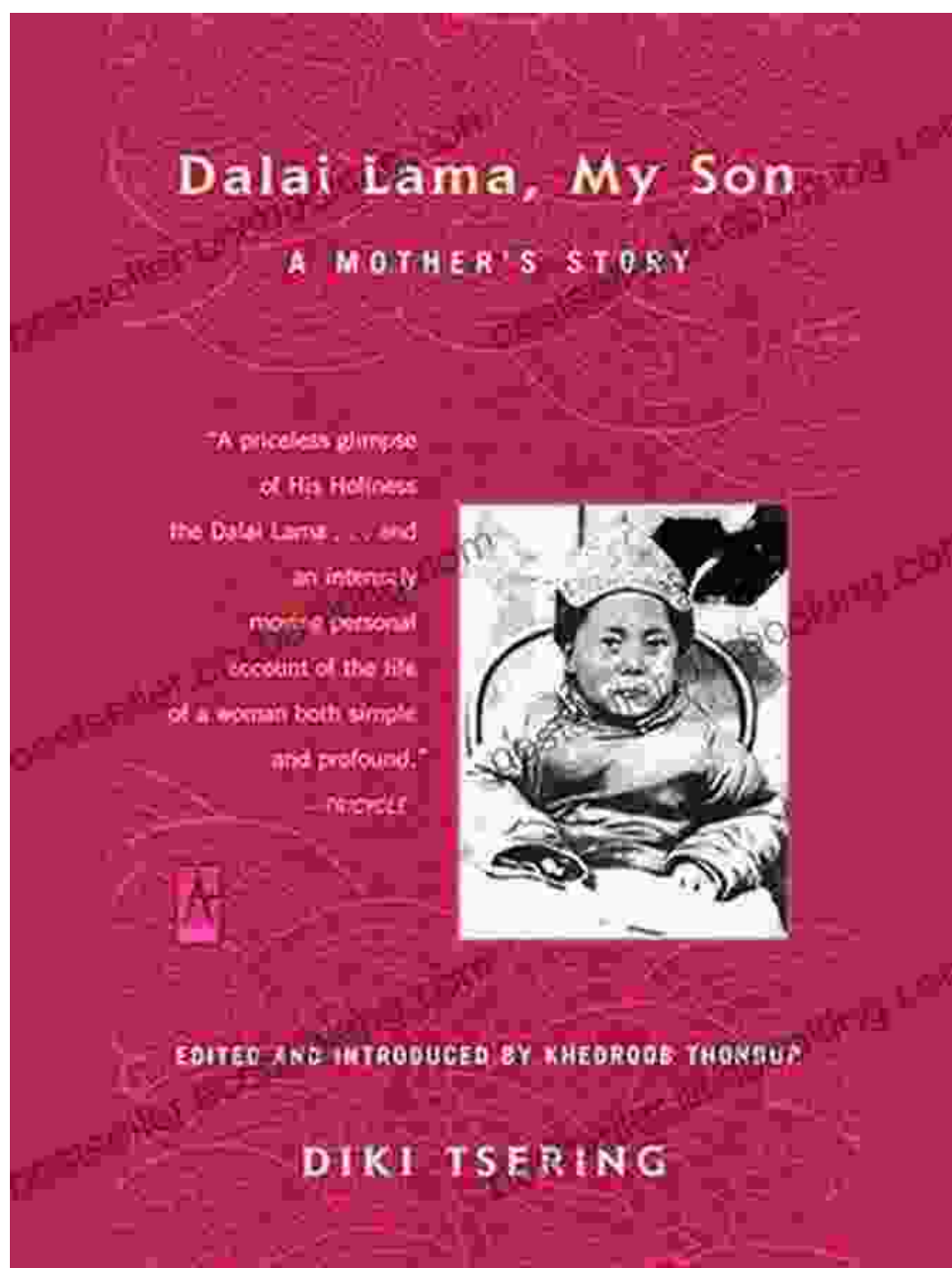
About the Author

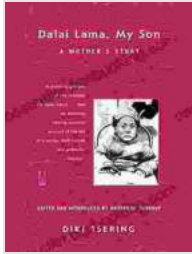

they lived in exile for the rest of their lives. Jetsun Pema passed away in 2003.

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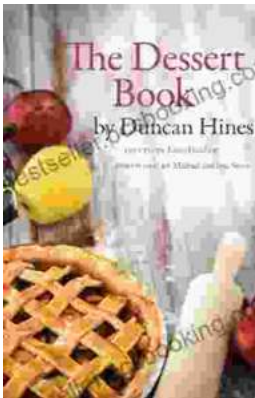




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
