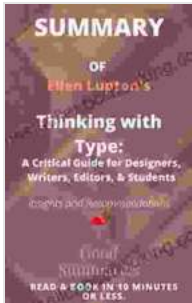

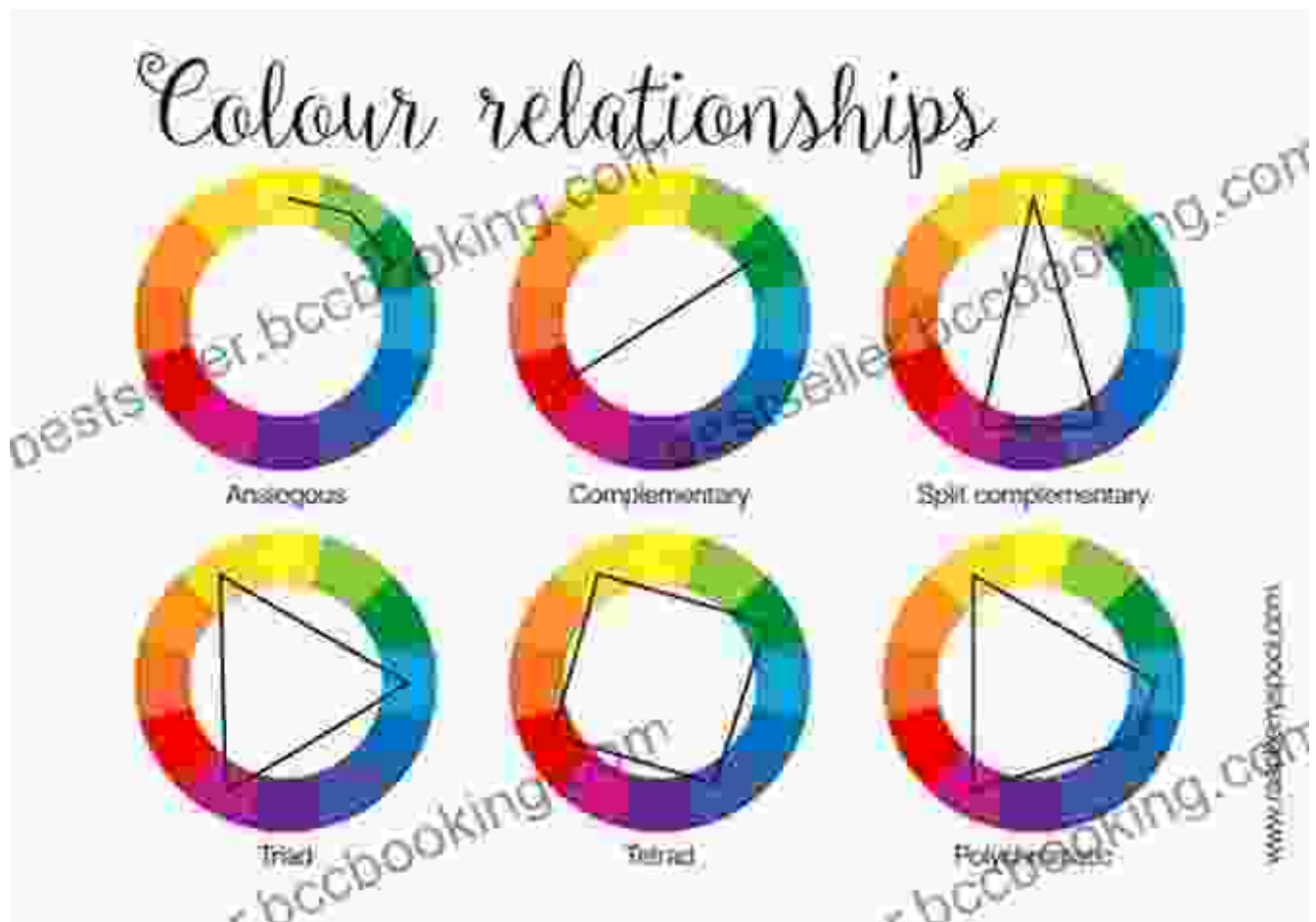

The principle of contrast refers to the juxtaposition of visually dissimilar elements in order to convey the fact that these elements are different.



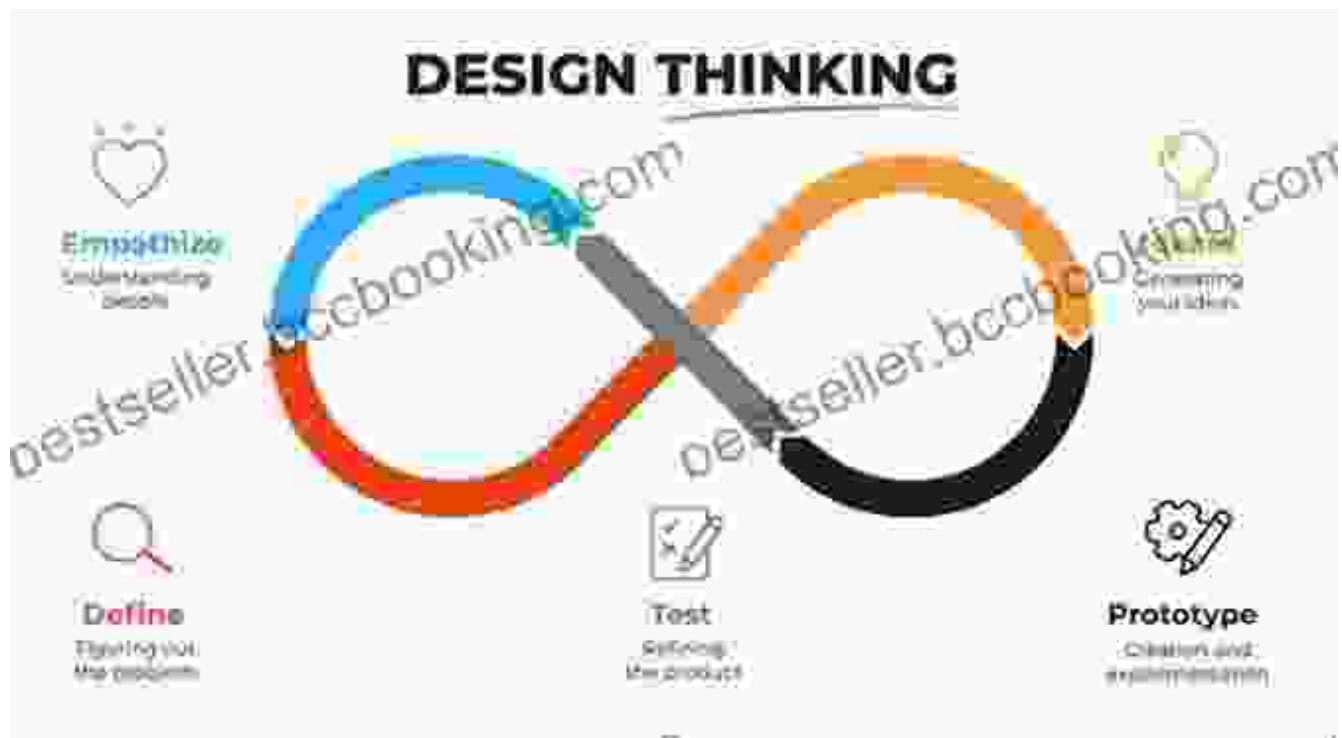
GESTALT PRINCIPLES

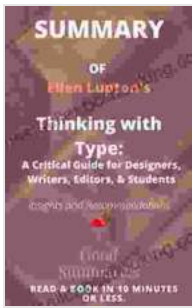

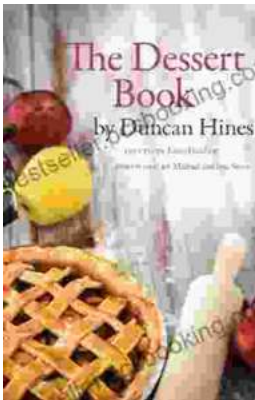
